



Guidelines for authors Netherlands Heart Journal

Aims and scope of the journal

The scope of the Netherlands Heart Journal (NHJ) is to contribute to the national and international literature by publishing scientific papers in the field of cardiovascular medicine. The journal aims to publish high-quality papers on a wide spectrum of cardiovascular medicine, with a focus on both clinical and experimental observations.

NHJ is made available to cardiologists, cardiologists in training, cardiopulmonary surgeons, cardiopulmonary surgeons in training, internists and paediatric cardiologists. The journal is the official journal of the Netherlands Society of Cardiology (NVVC).

There are no author publication charges (APC) to submit or publish an article in the journal. The full-text is freely available immediately upon online publication. Articles are published with a Creative Commons attribution license (CC BY) and the author(s) retain the copyright of their article.

NHJ is an English language, a single-blind peer-reviewed journal and is published 11 times a year.

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The Netherlands Heart Journal uses Editorial Manager, a web-based manuscript submission and review system that tracks manuscripts through the production process. Authors can only submit their manuscripts online. Online submission facilitates the submission of manuscripts from authors, streamlines the reviewing process, substantially reduces the editorial processing and reviewing times, and shortens overall publication times.

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Submission of a manuscript implies that the work described has not been published before; that it is not under consideration for publication elsewhere; that its publication has been approved by all co-authors, if any, as well as by the responsible authorities – tacitly or explicitly – at the institute where the work was carried out. The publisher will not be held legally responsible should there be any claims for compensation. Authors are responsible for acquisition of all data, analysis and interpretation of the data.

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Article categories

The Netherlands Heart Journal accepts the following categories of papers:

- Original (research) article a detailed study reporting original research containing a background, methods, results, interpretation of findings, and a discussion on the implications.
 Maximum of: 2200 words, 30 references, 3 figures*, 3 tables*, include an infographic or graphical abstract. Structured abstract max. 250 words in English and Dutch
 - Method section: describe exactly and detailed how you conducted the research. You need to clearly state 'what', 'how much', 'how often', 'where', 'when' and 'why'. It is not preferred to provide all the technical details in this section. Include the full methods as background information (which will be published online) and the abbreviated methods in the manuscript.
- **Study design article** a report on planned or ongoing research studies. Ensure that the study is started. Maximum of: **2200 words, 30 references, 2 figures***, **2 tables***. Structured abstract max. 250 words in English and Dutch.
- Review article an overview of existing literature, often identifying specific issues or problems and providing an analysis of data from published work on the subject.
 Maximum of: 3000 words, 50 references, 3 figures* and 3 tables*, include an infographic or graphical abstract. Abstract max 200 words in English and Dutch.
- Position statement a paper focusing on topics needing discussion or reconsideration.
 Authors should report a clear position on the target topic and should also suggest a proposal or actions regarding the target topic. Working groups, task forces and associations are invited to submit their position statement. Maximum of: 2000 words, 20 references, 2 figures and 1 tables*. Abstract max 200 words in English and Dutch. Authors who want to submit an opinion paper should first contact the journal editor: lieda.meester@bsl.nl.





- Opinion article a paper in which authors share their personal thoughts on a topic. Any claims should be supported by facts, statistics and/or examples of published research studies.
 Maximum of: 2000 words, 20 references, 2 figures and 1 tables*. Abstract max 200 words in English and Dutch. Authors who want to submit an opinion paper should first contact the journal editor: lieda.meester@bsl.nl.
- **Pro-con statement** NHJ's Editorial Board proposes a statement on a timely and controversial topic. Authors write in favour (pro) or against (contra) this statement. Maximum of: **1000** words, **15 references, no figure and 1 table**. Authors who want to submit a pro-con statement should first contact the journal editor: lieda.meester@bsl.nl.
- **Heart Beat** (short case)** maximum of: 150 words, 5 references and 1 figure (which may be subdivided into A and B, not more). No abstract and keywords are needed. In the print version, this category may not consist of more than 1.5 pages. Movies and videos are welcome, these will be published as online web material.
- Rhythm Puzzle / Image Puzzle- submit as two separate submissions:
 - Question: maximum of 150 words, 3 references and 2 figures (panel A and B permitted).
 - Answer: maximum of 250 words, 3 references and 2 figures (panel A and B permitted). In the print version, this category may not consist of more than 1.5 pages. Movies and videos are welcome, these will be published as online web material.
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- Commentary has a maximum of 800 words, 8 references, 1 figure, no table.
- Editor's Comment maximum of 800 words, 5 references, no figures and no tables.

Preparation of manuscripts

The title page should include: a concise and informative title; names of all authors with their affiliations and addresses, and the email address and telephone number of the corresponding author; word count; and number of tables and figures.

Authors affiliations: first name, initials and last name, institution (department), city, country. **Abstract**: please provide a structured abstract for original papers and study design articles, and an unstructured abstract for review articles and points of view. The abstract should not contain any undefined abbreviations, nor references and tables. An abstract is a short statement about your research or project designed to give the reader a complete, yet concise, understanding of your paper's research and findings. It gives a thorough overview of your paper or project so that a busy reader can decide whether to read the entire paper.

We encourage authors to also submit a graphical of visual abstract, a visual summary of the main messages of the paper.

Keywords: please provide 3 to 6 keywords which can be used for indexing purposes (use MeSH terms, see: www.nlm.nih.gov/mesh/meshhome.html).

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Electronic Supplementary Material (EMS): is material directly relevant to the conclusion of a paper that cannot be included in the printed version for reasons of space or medium (e.g. moving images, questionnaires, or background data). It will be included in the peer-review. As this material does not undergo language-editing, please ensure that it is clearly and succinctly presented, and that the
