

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR AUTHORS SUBMITTING THEIR MANUSCRIPTS IN ENGLISH

for

Chemistry and Technology of Fuels and Oils

1. Papers must be written in clear, lucid English. Please agree on the text with the experts in the English language before sending the manuscript to the Editor. If you are not a native English speaker, please have your paper edited by an editing agency.
2. Manuscripts must be double spaced to allow room for editing. This applies also to the Reference section.
3. The number following displayed equations must be flushed right. Use the abbreviation Eq. when followed by a single number, e.g., Eq. (1). For multiple equations, use the abbreviation Eqs., e.g., Eqs. (2) and (3). However, write “the transcendental equation (3)” (spell out equation in this case)
4. Use the proper punctuation mark after displayed equations [period (.), comma (,), or semicolon (;)], depending on the text following the equation(s).
5. Use the abbreviation Fig. when a number follows it, e.g., see Fig. 1, but spell it out when starting a sentence: **Figure 1 presents**.... . When there is only one figure or table, call it Fig. 1 and Table 1.
6. Figure captions take this form: **Fig. 1.** Effect of temperature on pressure. a) $t = 35^{\circ}\text{C}$; b) $t = 50^{\circ}\text{C}$; c) $t = 100^{\circ}\text{C}$.
7. Table captions are set in bold, upper and lower case letters: **TABLE 1. Coefficients Used in the Computation**
8. The manuscript may contain no more than 20 pages of the text (double spacing) including figures and tables.
9. The manuscript may contain no more than 6 figures and no more than 6 tables.
10. Figure captions must be clear and precise. If there are many lines in the figure, make sure that the lines are distinguishable and do not overlap one another.
11. The use of color in figures is unacceptable. Make sure that the colored lines on the graphs in the black and white image are distinguishable.
12. Exclude all abbreviations from the article and avoid contractions in the text such as “don’t, can’t, etc.
13. Article titles should be kept as short and specific as possible. The title of the article should not contain specific geographical names, names of cities, enterprises, etc., all of which should appear in the text or abstract.
14. Figures and tables that convey similar information should be avoided and their description be given in the text instead.
15. Use a numeric scheme for citing references in the text (instead of an alphabetic scheme). In the text, the citation is enclosed in square brackets, e.g., [1], [2, 3], [4-5], etc.: e.g. This value was obtained by finite element analysis [1].
Do not write: This value was obtained by finite element analysis (Oganesyan et al., 1960), or (Usmanov and Gabitov, 2011).
16. In the **REFERENCE** section the citation are numbered 1, 2, 3, etc.

Journal citations take this form:
